TRADITIONS CHECKLIST from the AA Grapevine

These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. While they were originally intended primarily for individual use, many AA groups have since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

Practice These Principles...

Tradition One: *Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity.*

1. Am I in my group a healing, mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories?
2. Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious preludes such as "just for the sake of discussion," plunge into argument?
3. Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
4. Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?
5. Do I put down some AA activities as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
6. Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of?
7. Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
8. Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?
9. Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?
10. Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?

The Benefit of Defects

I heard something extremely profound at a meeting the other day about defects of character. The speaker said that we are "connected by our defects" and that is so true.

When I first started attending meetings, I begin to hear my own story in the leads and comments of others. I began to realize that my character defects were not so different from those of everyone else. This was especially true concerning my behavior as an alcoholic, because I had that special wiring that always meant to have more... more of whether.

Where I had thought I was unique in my character defects -- a human being somewhat beyond the pale -- I began to realize that I was just another Bozo on the bus. My defects were very run-of-the-mill, especially among alcoholics. And because I was hearing so much about other people's defects, I began to feel connected to the group through those defects.

Ultimately I was also feeling connected to humanity.

I have always thought that what the program has provided most for me was a sense of connection to other people. I'm closer to alcoholics than to any members of my family or any other "normal" individuals. This has come about through attendance at many meetings and through hearing thousands of comments. When we share about ourselves, we're offering points of connection to others.

In the end, for me, that has not only meant sobriety but a profound sense of well-being and happiness that was completely unachievable and unthinkable before I walked through those doors.

I will be forever grateful.

Benefits of Recovery

There are two benefits from recovery: we have short-term gains and long-term gains. The short-term gains are the things we can do today that help us feel better immediately.

We can wake up in the morning, read for a few minutes in our meditation book, and feel lifted. We can work a Step and often notice an immediate difference in the way we feel and function. We can go to a meeting and feel refreshed, talk to a friend and feel comforted, or practice a new recovery behavior, such as dealing with our feelings or doing something good for ourselves, and feel relieved.

There are other benefits from recovery, though, that we don't see immediately on a daily or even a monthly basis. These are the long-term gains, the larger progress we make in our life.

Over the years, we can see tremendous rewards. We can watch ourselves grow strong in faith, until we have a daily personal relationship with a Higher Power that is as real to us as a relationship with a best friend.

We can watch ourselves grow beautiful as we shed shame, guilt, resentments, self-hatred, and other negative buildups from our past.

We can watch the quality of our relationships improve with family, friends, and spouses. We find ourselves growing steadily and gradually in our capacity to be intimate and close, to give and receive.

We can watch ourselves grow in our careers, in our ability to be creative, powerful, productive people, using our gifts and talents in a way that feels good and benefits others.

We discover the joy and beauty in ourselves, others, and life.

The long-term progress is steady, but sometimes slow; happening in increments and often with much forward and backward movement. Enough days at a time of practicing recovery behaviors and piling up short-term gains lead to long-term rewards.

What a Sponsor Is and Is Not

The opportunity to help another alcoholic work the Steps and live in the solution keeps me in the heart of what recovery is all about. It has helped me to feel a "part of"--something I had tried to do for years. But it turned out to be as simple as sharing my experience, strength, and hope with another drunk.

The Twelve Steps have the answers to all of the riddles life throws at me. Other drunks took the time to show me, not only by sharing their time and lives, but by living in the solution and dealing with whatever came along with faith and trust. This truly is attraction versus promotion. The "winners" worked the Steps and stayed involved in service--those were the people I wanted to hang out with; that is where I looked for a sponsor.

Today, I sponsor five women who are five reasons for my growth. I met four of these women in a Step meeting--the same meeting that laid the foundation of the Steps for me. I think that spending time at the same Step meeting listening to people share and getting to know them is the place to look for a sponsor. The Steps offer the solutions, and that was what I was looking to learn.

Spiritual fitness is required if I am to be of service to anyone. Without a connection to my Higher Power, I am the same old person with the same old defects, causing the same old pain in my life and others'. So often I have found myself at a complete loss of thought and words for a sponsee who is struggling with life, and then an intuitive thought comes to me and offers a new perspective for consideration. When I wonder where the thought came from, I feel the warmth in my heart, and I know that once again God has done for me what I can't do myself.

As a sponsor, I neither expect nor desire to make decisions for people. I just ask some extra questions about motives, honesty, and spiritual contact. I was taught to make informed decisions and stand ready to accept responsibility for those decisions. I was also taught that Steps Six and Seven come into play when fear is running those decisions. This was a big factor for me when I first started sponsoring--fear that I would mess it up and harm someone as well as the fear that I wouldn't know the "answers" and be viewed as a dope.

Thank God that today I have a clearer perspective on what my role as a sponsor is and isn't. It is to stay sober, be available to listen, share my thoughts, pray for others, and let them live their own lives. It is not to "fix" anyone, get them sober, make them happy, demand they conform, or make their decisions.

My God has blessed me with some incredible role models in sponsors and friends. What a lesson in humility and gratitude sponsorship has given me. I have grown so much in this program and in life. The Promises have come so true in my life--all from cleaning house, trusting God, and working with others.
